











Painting

As a Painting major at the Cleveland Institute of Art, you'll acquire a broad knowledge of the visual arts and an in-depth understanding of painting as a studio practice. Our faculty will guide you through individual and group studio critiques, workshops, seminars and courses on special topics.

Students in CIA's Painting program gain the technical skills necessary for competing as professional artists while developing the versatility and self-sufficiency to develop a successful career. You'll start out in the major with the fundamentals: learning how to develop a palette; build stretchers and supports; paint observationally; learn the principles of abstraction; idea development; and work presentation.

Once you have received a firm grounding in the technical aspects of painting, you'll be introduced to painting as a contemporary practice.

You'll develop a personal body of work and a professional approach to problem solving. Your knowledge and experience will be enriched as you pursue collaborations and shared coursework in other disciplines. Once a year, you'll have an opportunity to travel to New York City to visit professional galleries and exhibitions such as the Whitney Biennial and the Armory Show. In the professional practices course, you'll develop entrepreneurial skills, a professional portfolio, grant-writing experience, and the skills to approach dealers, curators, and collectors. You'll come to understand the business side of a creative practice.

Your faculty are committed artist professionals who will guide and mentor you through this development. Painting students have generous individual studio space and a well-equipped workshop, all within the skylit, factory loft space. The Painting curriculum culminates with an exhibition that consists not only of presenting a body of self-initiated work, but also an oral defense and a written artist statement.

Successful Alumni

Dana Schutz is one of the most successful American painters working today. She was included in the Venice Biennale just three years after she graduated from CIA. Her work has been acquired by major museums in North America and Europe.

Ben Grasso is an accomplished artist who had his first solo show in a New York City gallery within three years of graduation, and has since had additional solo shows in New York, Los Angeles, Chicago and Milan, Italy.

Amy Casey is a full-time painter who is represented by a Chicago gallery and has had solos shows in that city, as well as in Los Angeles, San Francisco and Cleveland. She has been awarded numerous competitive grants, fellowships and residencies.

Shoko Yamamura works for an international color consultancy, as a color designer/planner, examining color design and product development, including research, ideation, and concept sketching.

Through courses, extracurricular projects, and internships, students connect to real-world experiences. These opportunities are where the rubber meets the road—where you will put your classroom knowledge and skills to work in a professional environment.
